## AGM with Bruce Fuhrer

On 5 September we enjoyed our Annual General Meeting with guest speaker Bruce Fuhrer, mycologist extraordinaire. His spectacular photographs captivated the crowd of around 38 attendees. A minor technical difficulty in the way of a faulty projector cable at the Town Centre was quickly overcome thanks to the help and initiative of Graeme Lorimer.

Bruce's slideshow illustrated the wide variety of shapes and colours that fungi come in, from white to purples and bright reds and oranges. The patterning in some of the bracket fungi was absolutely spectacular.

He included fascinating stories of his experiences which included the night he discovered a mushroom that glows in the dark. His photos really illustrated how much its bioluminescence could light up a room.

Bruce's wit, and award-winning photographs really made for an entertaining presentation, one many of us will not soon forget.

A brief AGM followed Bruce's presentation and many people stayed on to join us for lunch. It was fantastic to meet some new people and catch up with old friends. Thanks must go to all those who contributed to organising the event and for the donations made to MEG that will help fund the group's future work.



## **Annual Summary**

### **July 2014 – June 2015**

After farewelling Kim Wormald and welcoming Bernard Heinze to the committee at last years AGM, the committee for the past year comprised four active members (Fiona Sutton, John Venn, Marcus Wills-Cooke and Bernard Heinze) and two support members (Vanessa Marrama and Annette Muir).

MEG has made a big contribution over the past year holding a variety of events and advocating for the environment. The committee occasionally distributed the MEG brochure to the library and local shops around Montrose in a hope of attracting new members. As of June 2015, MEG had 48 financial memberships either as life members, groups, families or singles (three less than the same time last year).

Events and happenings over the last financial year are as follows.

#### **AGM August 2014**

The AGM was a great success last year, held on 31 August. Special guests Jean and David Edwards had attendees enthralled with their slideshow presentation. Earlier that year they were honored as Yarra Ranges Shire Council's Environmental Achievers of the Year.

David and Jean began by giving a history of their environmental activities which started in the 1970's as members of the Montrose Environmental Group. Many familiar names were mentioned of environmentally-minded people, past and present.

The slide show continued onto their amazing home, which was built in the 1970's using sustainable design and resource principles. Their garden includes a large veggie patch and an even larger bush block that they have cared for and improved the quality of.

Finally they discussed their work on the Mt Evelyn Aqueduct. A large portion of their lives has been volunteered to advocate for the protection of the reserve and

undertake management to protect and enhance its ecological values.

The presentation by the Edwards was then followed by the brief AGM and lunch allowing members to catch up and meet new people.

#### **Spring Bird Walk, Chelodina Festival and Christmas Party**

MEG was asked to hold a stall at the Chelodina Festival on 7 December. As the festival fell on the weekend we usually try to hold our Christmas party and our resources were wearing thin for the Bird Survey, we decided to join the events together.

The Chelodina Festival was held by the Yarra Ranges Council and Friends of Elizabeth Bridge Reserve. Despite the rain, there were many people at the event, mostly involved in the music performances that dominated the day.

Around 10 people attended the bird survey that was led by Jonathon Ricciardello, a Zoologist with Ecology Australia (flora and fauna consultants). The waterbirds put on a lovely display for the small group who enjoyed close viewing as they grazed and paddled. Other interesting facts about plants and wetland ecology were discussed to give a more holistic appreciate of the reserve.

We had a delicious spread of food to share, including one of my favorites... Cherries! It was very fulfilling to reflect on the achievements the group had made over the past year.

#### **Kevin & Jill Heinze People's Garden working bee**

Roger and Barbara Rooks have been maintaining MEGs native garden at the Kevin and Jill Heinze People's Garden. In fact they've been maintaining it so well that it was decided a working bee was not necessary this year. We are hoping to be able to put a sign up to identify MEG's area and help promote the group.

A big thank you must go to Roger and Barbara for all their hard work.

## **Friends of Bungalook Conservation Reserves Update**

The Friends of Bungalook Conservation Reserves had eleven working bees during the past year, averaging 5-6 people and representing about 200 person-hours. Over 100 hours was also spent outside working bees, particularly organising burns and tending spider-orchids. The reserve's habitat for flora and fauna continues to improve. There has been good regeneration following burns in March 2012 and March 2014, including some rare species that had died out apart from seeds in the soil.

We are hoping that the 2014 fire stimulated germination of new plants of the Kilsyth South Spider-orchid, in which case we might detect them when flowering this spring or next. Currently, the known wild population remains at three. There are also four plants in pots that germinated at the Royal Botanic Gardens in late 2013 (a big milestone, surviving to this stage) and a batch of tiny seedlings that have just been taken out of their sterile germination flask.

A new issue has emerged in recent months. Melbourne Water wishes to completely clear the retarding basin embankment (including some extremely rare plants) and keep it covered with mown grass. It's not clear why this is necessary but the impact would be enormous. It looks like the new MEG committee will have some persuading to do regarding this matter.

The group was also awarded a grant from the Port Phillip and Westernport CMA. As a result \$22,400 is now available to undertake two ecological burns which have the added bonus of reducing fuel loads.

## **Friends of Heathfield Creek Update**

We are definitely making a difference, now half way through our 13th year of weeding determinedly. We were rewarded in March

this year when a juvenile echidna was spotted in the Reserve. Our youngsters were excited to see their distinct scratchings in the earth.

We are beginning to find areas, that once filled with ivy and honey suckle and /or blackberry and angled onion are now only requiring spot weeding, mostly ivy seedlings brought in by bird droppings.

These same areas are regrowing indigenous vegetation, which supports the theory that if we carefully restore the higher quality areas the bush will come back by itself.

We are still having big flushes of yellow buttercup in the secondary waterways.

With so much rain of late and the ground so soft underfoot, tackling this without causing erosion is a problem so we're waiting for drier conditions.

We are really keen to get new members with an abundance of energy and a passion for the natural environment to help us take on some of our more challenging areas.

The SYR is using our site as one of their survey points to monitor impacts of climate change on indigenous flora.

SYR, Melbourne Water and contractors from Eco Repair continue to provide valuable resources and support to assist our work at the Reserve.

### Boral Quarry

It was noticed that a group of trees were cleared at the Kilsyth Quarry. To ensure that the clearing was undertaken with appropriate approvals, MEG contacted the Yarra Ranges Council and Councillor Len Cox. It was determined that the clearing was legal so no further action was necessary.

No other action occurred last year but that they've recently sent out a survey request that we encouraged people to respond to.

### Walkabout Montrose

Walkabout Montrose is still on sale in a number of locations around Montrose

including Montrose Post Office, Montrose Meats and Kuranga Native Nursery. As with previous years, sales have slowed, as would be expected.

### Yarra Ranges Shire Draft Environment Strategy Submission

MEG made a submission to the Yarra Ranges regarding their Draft Environment Strategy. On the whole we were generally pleased with the broad and strategic document but felt that the lack of specific targets/actions can lead to inaction. Our submission included some recommendations for minor changes that provide more specific targets. It also acknowledged that the Strategy addressed climate change in more of an adaptation manner, with less focus on reducing emissions which we consider unsatisfactory.

### Wildlife Camera

Graeme Lorimer purchased a wildlife camera on behalf of MEG. It is currently having technical issues and will hopefully be back up and running soon.

A big thank you must also go to Len Cox for covering the cost of the venue for our AGM and officiating at the election of office bearers.
